BIODIVERSITY POLICY

Version 1 - Adopted by Environment Committee on 11th December 2024
Revision by Environment Committee due: December 2025

1. Introduction and Background

- 1.1. In accordance with the duty imposed on town and parish councils by Section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006, updated by Section 102 of the Environment Act 2021, Helsby Parish Council (hereinafter referred to as the Council) which has any functions exercisable in relation to England must from time to time consider what action the authority can properly take, consistently with the proper exercise of its functions, to further the general biodiversity objective. This duty also means that town and parish councils can spend funds in conserving biodiversity.
- 1.2. Government guidance published on 17 May 2023 clarifies that, as a public authority, town and parish councils must:
 - consider what they can do to conserve and enhance biodiversity;
 - agree policies and specific objectives based on their consideration; and
 - act to deliver their policies and achieve their objective.

2. Definition

- 2.1. According to Defra (Biodiversity 2020), biodiversity is the variety of all life on Earth. It includes all species of animals and plants – everything that is alive on our planet. Biodiversity is important for its own sake and has its own intrinsic value. Several studies have shown this value also goes further. Biodiversity is the building block of our 'ecosystems' that in turn provide us with a wide range of goods and services that support our economic and social wellbeing. These include essentials such as food, fresh water and clean air, but also less obvious services such as protection from natural disasters, regulation of our climate, and purification of our water or pollination of our crops. Biodiversity also provides important cultural services, enriching our lives.

3. Aims and Objectives

- 3.1. The object of this policy is to work towards conserving and enhancing the biodiversity of the Council's area. The Full Council and any committees of the Council will seek to consider sustainability, environmental impact and

biodiversity when making decisions and will seek to develop and implement policies and strategies as required.

3.2. In particular, the Council will aim to improve the biodiversity of the area in the following ways:

- consider the potential impact on biodiversity represented by planning applications;
- manage its land and property using environmentally friendly practices that will promote biodiversity;
- support local businesses and council operations in the adoption of low impact/nature positive practices;
- encourage and support other organisations within the parish to manage their areas of responsibility with biodiversity in mind; and
- support residents and local organisation activities to enhance and promote biodiversity.

4. Actions

Planning Applications

4.1. The Council will:

- when commenting on planning applications, seek to support site and building design that benefits biodiversity through the conservation and integration of existing habitats or provision of new habitats;
- seek to support protection of sensitive habitats from development and will consider whether the development would mean the loss of important habitats for wildlife in respect of all applications; and
- consider what each proposed development might make in terms of biodiversity net gain.

Land and Property Management

4.2. The Council will:

- consider carrying out a biodiversity audit of its landholdings;
- consider the conservation and promotion of local biodiversity with regard to the management of its open spaces. This will include adopting beneficial practices with regarding to cutting and removal of vegetation, application of chemicals and timing of maintenance work, paying attention to the Government's regulations for plant protection products;
- take special care in the specification of grounds maintenance contracts to ensure that the work, whilst reaching acceptable standards, does not harm the natural environment;
- source sustainable materials when procuring supplies for the Council's use;

- carry out additional hedge/tree planting in any appropriate areas, including the parish field;
- manage the parish field and other areas of land under council management for the benefit of wildlife; and
- consider biodiversity issues and the implementation of changes when managing its buildings.

Local Community

4.3. The Council will:

- seek to raise public awareness of biodiversity issues, including through its website and newsletters;
- seek to encourage residents to remove litter and pick up after their dogs;
- seek to engage with local businesses and residents regarding biodiversity in the community and how members of the community can assist and make a difference; and
- where feasible, involve the community in biodiversity projects on its land including for example tree planting, wildflower meadows, bird and bat box making.

Other

4.4. The Council will:

- Seek to arrange training for council staff and councillors on biodiversity best practice; and
- Support the local borough council in continuing to provide local wildflower corridors.

5. Partners

5.1. The Council will seek to work in partnership with other organisations to protect, promote and enhance biodiversity within the council area. It will review any local nature recovery strategies, species conservation strategies, or protected site strategies in respect of local Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSIs) and consider how it may become more involved in implementing the strategies' recommendations.

6. Monitoring

6.1. Section 7 below will outline how the policy has been implemented and will be updated annually. The recommendations of any future biodiversity audit reports will also be included in this section along with an action plan which will be used to outline progress.

7. Progress so Far

7.1. The Council has implemented the following biodiversity projects so far:

- Planted additional trees on the parish field;
- Provided around 30 planters and funds winter bedding plants throughout the village to encourage insects to flourish;
- Maintains a 'wildlife corridor' at the Old Chester Road allotment site for the benefit of slow-worms and other wildlife, including the use of log piles, compost heaps and an underground hibernaculum; and
- Planted a tree at Helsby Community Sports Club in support of the Queen's Green Canopy.
